Jenny received a phone call from Peter and Marilyn who had broken down on they way to the garden centre, but would still hoped to get the the pub.



Visit to the Athelstan Museum

24 members, including some guests, attended the Athelstan Museum, in the Town Hall at Malmesbury, for a guided tour followed by a visit to a temporary exhibition of an N-Gauge model railway layout and a talk from Bill Reed, one of our members who is a volunteer at the museum.

The museum is named after King Athelstan, a grandson of Alfred the Great and considered to be the first King of all England. It covers two floors and amongst the exhibits are an original watercolour of Malmesbury Abbey by JMW Turner, a hoard of Roman coins found locally in 2012, along with a number of medieval coins, a replica Athelstan sword made by local artisans and a whole lot more! There were also some fascinating histories of local industries and, in the Malmesbury Voices Project, recordings of local people telling stories of life and work in Malmesbury.

After a good look around the main museum we had a short walk to the Rausing Building, an ex Moravian church, to visit a temporary exhibition of an N-Gauge model railway layout of Malmesbury station. The layout was created by Rev'd Chris Burch in 2016 and, apart from being compressed in length, is a faithful replica of the station in the 1930's.



Bill started his talk explaining the circumstances and co-incidences that led to his discovery of the layout, and later on to his discovery of 'Malmesbury Abbey', a steam locomotive.



Although Chris Burch had never visited Malmesbury he had taken his inspiration from photographs in books about the branch line. Once completed the layout was displayed a few times before Chris sadly unexpectedly died. Several friends, who had helped in the construction, were involved in preserving and storing the layout and it was through one of these that Bill heard of its existence and arranged for it to be displayed at the museum.

Having discovered the existence of the Star Class locomotive 'Malmesbury Abbey' Bill was keen to find out all about it. His research led to his obtaining a 00 scale Star Class engine and changing its identity to 4062 'Malmesbury Abbey', which was also displayed in the museum.

Bill also told us the life story of George Jackson Churchward, the designer of the Star Class locos for the Great Western Railway. Churchward was the Chief Mechanical Engineer for the GWR from 1902 to 1922 and is fondly remembered in Swindon as the first Mayor.

Very many thanks to Bill for enabling such a fantastic visit enjoyed by us all. A donation will be made to the Athelstan Museum to show our appreciation.
