AFTER a 2,000 mile drive across Britain, Mrs Morris, a 40-year-old Morris Minor, made it back to Malmesbury in one piece last week.

Driver Julian Marshall, 62, of Common Road, Malmesbury, with co-driver Paul Harris, 61, of Cheltenham, were taking part in a Morris rally from John O' Groats to Land's End in aid of Malmesbury Area Youth Support.

Although Mrs Morris, a 1963 Minor 1,000, had clocked up 186,000 miles before the trip, she finished the rally in under 24-hours pulling in to Lands End at around 5am Wednesday morning after leaving John O'Groats at 11am the previous day.

Mr Marshall said he was very pleased that she ran very smoothly throughout the trip and said she looked like she could go another 186,000 miles.

This was more than could be said for the drivers.

"My back and shoulder is a bit stiff and my arms are a bit tired," he said. "We were very pleased though. Without rest breaks we averaged about 60 miles an hour, quite amazing when you consider she normally only goes to Cirencester and back."

The trip was aimed at raising money and the profile of MAYS, a charity that provides support to young people aged between 12 and 25 with concerns about bullying, family problems, drugs and alcohol abuse, who live in the Malmesbury School catchment area.

The money raised will be spent on schemes such as peer mentoring which began at the end of last month.

We held cotton bolls and had demonstrations of carding and spinning. It was interesting to reflect on the challenges that Richard Arkwright had to face in introducing new industrial developments.

He brought it over so that it could be appropriately parked up under the North Wilts flag. He was kept very busy with questions about the car and said that he had learnt a few things too. He also won a prize!
