Shallbourne Show had grown this year from 300 classic vehicles in 2024 to 400 on display, this year.




There were a significant number of Morris Minors: different models in varying conditions and colours. Several North Wilts. Branch cars

In the Branch 40th Anniversary Album I compiled in 2021, you will find on pages 8 and 9 a brief account of the Morris Minor built to order for Mr Law in Swindon in 1974, after factory production had ended.



One of our members, Robert Harrin, wrote an article about it in Minor Matters in May/June 2016; the car itself appeared at our Branch Rally at REME in 2022; and in May/June 2023 I contributed an article to Minor Matters on its



connection with Bampton's Coachbuilders in Swindon. Other accounts have appeared in various publications.

The car is now owned by Andy Smith in Derbyshire and a few months ago he was contacted by Denise Law, the granddaughter of the car's first owner. She had just discovered that the car still existed; and until then neither Andy nor I knew of her, or the whereabouts of her father Rod, who negotiated the build of the car for his father.

As a result Denise has kindly offered to bring Rod down to see us at our AGM on 19 October. This will be an opportunity for Branch members to chat to them and maybe learn something more about the car's early life and its exploits, including the extraordinary 1982 "car pull" from Swindon to Oxford in aid of Cancer Research, in which our own current member Robin Phillips took part.

# Converting to an electric power unit for the steering of my Morris Minor.

I had for some time thought about making the steering of my car easier to use at low speed when parking etc. Having some time ago fitted van wheels with modern tyres it had become much more difficult.

On talking to Alex Alexander about this, he mentioned that Bill Reed and himself had fitted, a few years ago, electric power steering to their cars and had never regretted it. This renewed my interest in thinking this may be the solution to my problem.

Bill gave me a copy of the article he had written in 2018 and had been published in a car magazine, explaining how Easysteer in Bolton had fitted the system in his Triumph and Alex's Morris Minor. On my contacting this company they explained that they would need me to take my car to them to provide a quote to manufacture and fit a system.

As I wished to install the unit myself, I decided to search the internet and came across another company called EZ Electric Power Steering in Leerdam Holland, who have produced a conversion kit for the Morris Minor which I could install. This suited me fine as I had carried out all the modifications to my car. Also they had one in stock at a price a lot cheaper than other companies in the UK selling the same system.

I agreed to place an order and made the payment. Two days later I received a notification from the delivery company in the UK to say they would be delivering the package that day. An amazing service!

The kit included the steering column with electric motor, the control box and the wiring loom, all ready to fit. All I had to do was undo the small bolt at the bottom of the column under the carpet and the two bolts to the clamp at the wheel end, also remove the wheel and horn push. Then remove the column ready for the replacement column.

As I had made and fitted a small panel to the glove shelf and below the dash, I would now have to make a new one as the electric motor was going to be here, (see photo below), this was already fitted to the new steering column. Also the control box and the wiring loom would be located here. This took some planning and adjusting until I managed to get it all in the restricted space, also making and fitting the new face panel.

Having completed the installation of the new unit I then drove the car out of the garage to find out if it all worked, I noticed immediately the improvement



in the steering. On completing the test run, I adjusted the potentiometer using the small control knob located on the new panel to suit my driving.

Brilliant, my decision to do this conversation was a success. I can now get the Morris into the garage in one go, which I was not able to do before. The overall time in doing the conversion was two and half days, most of the time was in having to make the new panel and sorting the new wiring.

I have to thank Alex and Bill who advice was a great help in my making decision to do the conversion.
